

Sonny McAfee has over forty years of experience in Criminal Justice with 22 years as a prosecutor, legal advisor, and legal expert instructor and 20 years prior to that as a police officer with Houston Police Department. Sonny retired as a lieutenant in the Houston Police Department Homicide Division. He became a Houston Police Officer at the age of 19 and stayed with the department where he worked his way up in investigative divisions such as Narcotics, Internal Affairs and Homicide. Sonny also served as a helicopter pilot for the police department and as a member of a patrol tactical unit. He is a graduate of the 129th session of the FBI National Academy.

Sonny obtained his law degree from the University of Houston and was licensed as an attorney prior to his retirement from the Houston Police Department. Upon retirement Sonny worked as an attorney for the First Court of Appeals in Houston. He was a prosecutor in Harris County and later in Smith County. As a prosecutor Sonny tried cases ranging from Driving While Intoxicated to Death Penalty Capital Murder cases. He became the Legal Advisor for the Irving Police Department where he worked as legal counsel for the police department, trained officers in legal aspects of investigations and represented the Police Department in litigation.

Following 911, Sonny went to Europe for the Department of Justice in Albania as the senior anti-human trafficking advisor. His next assignment was as team leader and technical advisor in Bosnia-Herzegovina with his wife, Jill a technical advisor. Together they developed training for police officers and prosecutors in the First Criminal Procedure Code of that country following its war with Serbia. Upon his return stateside, Sonny trained and assisted police officers and prosecutors from Alaska to South Carolina in search warrant writing, trial preparation and criminal investigations. In November 2012, Sonny won election for District Attorney of the 33rd and 424th Judicial Districts of Texas in the Texas Hill Country and took office January 1, 2013.

With his extensive background in prosecution and law enforcement, Sonny approaches prosecution and law enforcement as a co-operative effort to seek justice for citizens. Law enforcement works very hard to investigate and arrest offenders who plague our community through child abuse, crimes against persons and property and drug dealing.

In the last year, the District Attorney's Office led by Sonny McAfee, prosecuted many serious cases and obtained lengthy sentences to prevent criminals from re-offending in our community. Predators of children have been sentenced to terms that prevent them from ever offending against members of our community again.

By effectively prosecuting those who commit crimes, the District Attorney's Office has satisfied its objective to seek justice and help make the four counties of this District one of the safest areas in Texas in which to work, live and raise children.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 86TH LEGISLATURE

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 86TH LEGISLATURE

FISCAL DISCIPLINE

• **House Bill 1** is a balanced budget. After accounting for \$5 billion in property tax relief, the budget stays underthe rate of population plus inflation and stays under all four constitutional spending limits.

TAXPAYER RELIEF, REFORM AND PR OTECTION

- House Bill 3 provides almost \$5 billion in property tax relief. It increases the state's share of education funding inorder to buy down school district property taxes, mandates ongoing reductions in school property tax rates, andrequires districts to conduct efficiency audits to ensure taxpayer dollars are being used responsibly.
- **Senate Bill 2** reforms the property tax system to make it more transparent. It provi des real-time tax information toinform property owners who is proposing to raise their rates, by how much, and when and where they can go toprotest. Additionally, it lowers the voter approval rate to 3.5% for most taxing units, triggering an automaticelection for voters to approve the increase when it exceeds the voter approval rate.
- **Senate Bill 68** requires a fiscal review of every state agency under review by the Su

nset Advisory Commission topromote transparency, identify waste and inefficiencies and ensure responsible stewardship of taxpayer dollars.

- **House Bill 3143** increases transparency and public participation in the Chapter 312 tax incentive and economic development program by imposing additional public notice, hearing and reporting requirements for certain agreements.
- **House Bill 1883** allows active duty military to pay property taxes late without penalty when away from home formilitary service.
- House Bill 492 and HJR 35 provide for a temporary property tax exemption during a declared disaster.
- · House Bill

1060 allows a property owner to request the notice of an appraisal protest be sent by email.

- **House Bill**
- **1885** makes it possible to waive penalties if a bank fails to forward the tax bill to a property owner intime, protecting homeowners from unreasonable fines that are out of their control.
- **House Bill 440** allows for more oversight and transparency when a local government is issuing bonds for projects or wants to use unspent bond proceeds for another purpose.

PUBLIC EDUCATION

House

Bill 3 is transformational school finance reform. It devotes \$4.5 billion to education reforms, \$2 billion fordynamic teacher pay raises, and will reduce recapture by \$3.6 billion.

• **House Bill 3906** reduces testing stress on teachers and students by allowing STAAR and end-of-courseassessments to be administered in multiple parts over more than

one day. Additionally, this bill limits thenumber of multiple choice questions that can be included on STAAR tests, eliminates the stand-alone writingtests in grades 4 and 7, requires the state to develop a plan to transition to electronic assessments, andestablishes a pilot program to explore the possibility of replacing the STAAR with a different test.

- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$219 million for various special education programs to comply with federal maintenance of financial support.
- House Bill 111 requires training for teachers in signs of child abuse.
- **House Bill 403** requires administrators to be trained in recognizing human trafficking.
- **Senate Bill 11** will "harden" schools to make them safer, adding security personnel, making building securityupgrades, providing technology and more.
- **Senate Bill 1230 and Senate Bill 1231** protect students in private schools from educators with a history ofinappropriate misconduct.
- **Senate Bill 1451** allows a teacher to remove a student from a classroom or take disciplinary action without repercussions.
- **Senate Bill 2432** protects teachers from harassment by students.

RETIRED TEACHERS

- **Senate Bill 500** dedicates \$589 million to TRS to provide retired teachers with a \$2,000 13th check on average.
- **Senate Bill 500** also dedicates \$524 million to make TRS actuarially sound, which needed to happen before the state can provide a cost of living adjustment down the line.
- **Senate Bill 500** also dedicates \$230.8 million to cover shortfalls at TRS and ensure retired teachers' healthcarepremiums do not increase.

HIGHER EDUCATION

• **House Bill 1** provides \$500 million

in increased formula funds for all higher education institutions.

- **House Bill 1735 and Senate Bill 212** better protects students from sexual assaults on campus.
- \cdot $\,$ Senate Bill 25 streamlines the transfer of credits between community colleges and general academic institutions.
- · Senate Bill 38 better protects students from hazing.
- · House Bill 1702 creates a foster care liaison

at institutions to help students who were formerly in the foster caresystem.

House Bill 3652 creates a state repository for Open
 Source Materials which will save students money ontextbook costs.

CONSUMER PROTECTION

- **House Bill 1941** allows the Attorney General to investigate and file a restraining order against freestandingemergency rooms that are price gouging their patients.
- **Senate Bill 1624** bans balance billing, which occurs when consumers are led to believe their medical treatment iscovered by insurance when it isn't and are left to pa v

the balance. This bill creates a new system that removes consumers from balance billing disputes, leaving the settlement over reimbursement between the insurer and provider.

House Bill 2624, House Bill 2625 and House

Bill 2945 criminalize card skimming and possessing card skimmingdevices and implement measures to monitor gas pumps to prevent future criminal actions.

House Bill 2697 gives victims of identity
theft who are threatened, abused or deceived into providing
identifying information the same access to recovery tools as nonconsensual identity
theft.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

• **Senate Bill 500** dedicates over \$2 billion to the Governor's Office for disaster grants and hurricane Harveyrecovery.

House

Bill 5 creates a catastrophic debris management plan for local communities to expedite debris removalfollowing a disaster.

- **House Bill 6** creates a "Disaster Recovery Task Force" to help communities with specialized assistance when adisaster strikes until long-term recovery.
- **House Bill 7** compiles disaster regulatory waivers needed during a disaster to have them ready to go (expedites response/recovery).
- · Senate Bill 7 creates the Flood

Infrastructure Fund to fund a statewide effort for regional flood planning andflood mitigation projects to strengthen our state's infrastructure.

- **HJR 4** proposes a constitutional amendment for voters in Nov 2019 providing for the creation of the floodinfrastructure fund to assist in financing drainage, flood mitigation and flood control projects.
- **House Bill 2305** enhances emergency management training for personnel at the state and local level.
- **House Bill 2320** improves public infrastructure and the hardening of utilities and facilities.
- · **House Bill 2340** strengthens data sharing and technology used in emergency management operations.

FIGHTING SEXUAL ASSAULT

- House Bill 8 eliminates the backlog of rape kits.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$56.6 million to eliminate the backlog and increase crime lab capacity.
- **House Bill 1** provides \$8.6 million for rape crisis centers and SANE nurses to the Office of the Attorney General.
- · House Bill 616 streamlines procedures related to the processing

and collecting of evidence related to sexual assault, making it easier for healthcare providers to get reimbursed for the medical exams and less burdensome for the law enforcement agency to facilitate that process. It also exten ds the period during which a sexual assault of fense has to be reported.

· House Bill

3106, "Molly Jane's Law", requires law enforcement agencies to enter the personal information of suspects of sexual offenses into a statewide database to improve the ability of law enforcement agencies to identify statewide assault patterns and investigate across jurisdictional lines.

• **House Bill 3809** doubles the amount of time a victim of childhood sex abuse has to file a civil lawsuit against their abuser from 15 to 30 years.

4345 guarantees civil immunity for employees of charitable organizations who act in good faith toreport individuals with a history of sexual misconduct. This bill breaks the cycle of pre dators moving between charitable organizations and prevents them from harming others.

· House Bill

667, "Melissa's Law", enhances the penalty for crimes of incestuous sexual assault from a second-degree felony to a first degree felony.

• **House Bill 531** prohibits hospitals from destroying medical records from forensic medical examinations of sexual assault victims until 15 years after the records w ere created.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND BORDER SECURIT Y

- **Senate Bill 20** codifies recommendations from the Texas Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force report issued in December 2018. These recommendations crack down on illicit massage businesses, enh ance investigative and prosecutorial tools and protect trafficking victims.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$27.8 million for human and child sex trafficking investigative squads, anti-gang squadsand regional human trafficking investigative squads at DPS.
- **House Bill 1** provides \$5.5 million for anti-human trafficking enforcement unit at TABC.
- **House Bill 1** funds \$3.4 million for the expansion of the Human Trafficking Prevention section at the Office of theAttorney General.
- **House Bill 1** devotes \$1.5 million for the creation of a Human Trafficking Team and to increase inspections of establishments with a high risk for human trafficking at the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation.
- **House Bill 1** maintains the levels of funding for border security over the previous biennium.
- House Bill 1 dedicates \$5

million to Texas Parks and Wildlife for equipment to improve game wardens'communic ation statewide, \$7.5 million to

DPS for Operation Draw Bridge Cameras and 4 analysts for the Transnational Intelligen ce Center and \$1.7 million

in grants for border prosecution, border zone firedepartments and economic developm ent along the border.

SUPPORTING LAW ENFORCEMENT, M ILITARY FAMILIES AND VETERANS

- **House Bill 1883** allows active duty military to pay property taxes late without penalty when away from home for military service.
- · Senate Bill 1200 allows Texas licensing

agencies to grant temporary licenses to a military spouse moving toTexas who carry a comparable license from other states.

- **House Bill 1597** helps students in military families more easily establish residency to attend charter schools.
- **House Bill 3601** allows institutions of higher education to offer competency-based programs for militaryservicemen.

MENTAL HEALTH

- **House Bill 19** places non-physician mental health professionals at education service centers to provide resourcesfor educators and administrators in school districts and charter schools.
- **Senate Bill 11** creates the Texas Mental Health Care Consortium to facilitate access to mental health careservices through telehealth and the child psychiatry access network and expand the mental health workforcethrough training and funding opportunities.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$7.7 billion for behavioral health and substance abuse services.

HEALTHCARE

 \cdot $\,$ House Bill 1 allocates \$86 million in rate increases for community care and Intellectual and DevelopmentalDisability

(IDD) providers, pediatric home therapist and pediatric private duty nursing.

- **House Bill 1** provides \$48 million for rate increases and cost growth for Early Childhood Intervention, \$11.7 million for salary increases to hire and retain Adult Protective Services workers and supports Community Based Careexpansion for foster care.
- **Senate Bill 1207** increases access to resources and information for families' of medically fragile children inMedicaid, establishes an independent review of managed care decisions and puts greater protections in place formedically fragile kids and their families.
- **Senate Bill 1096** improves medication access for kids with disabilities by prohibiting prior authorizations or anyother barriers from being used to negatively impact a child's access to care and streamlines the priorauthorization process when a child is hospitalized.
- House Bill 72 allows adoptive parents continued access to intensive Medicaid services post-adoption for a childwith a chronic health condition and establishes a program that protects the continuity of care for each childfollowing adoption
- **House Bill 2050** protects residents in nursing homes and long-term care facilities from being coerced, influenced or unknowingly administered an antipsychotic or neuroleptic medication without written consent from the residentor a person authorized to consent on their behalf, reducing the potential for abuse.
- **House Bill 1576** provides flexibility in the Medicaid medical transportation program by allowing Medicaid clients toutilize ride-sharing companies to provide transportation to appointments.
- **House Bill 4533** establishes a pilot program to provide long term services and supports within Medicaidmanaged care for those with IDD and a pilot program for providing dental services in Medicaid to those withIDD.
- **House Bill 123** allows youth in foster care, youth experiencing homelessness, and unaccompanied minors to receive copy of their birth certificate without parental consent and with no fee and apply for a Driver's License or state IDwithout paying a fee.
- **Senate Bill 1564** improves access to medication-assisted treatment for Texans with substance use disorder byauthorizing Medicaid reimbursement for the prescribing of buprenorphine by an advanced practice registere dnurse. Buprenorphine counteracts opioid addiction.
- **House Bill 3345** requires private health plans to cover telemedicine just as they would an in-person visit.

WOMEN'S HEALTH

- **House Bill 1** provides a 24.3% increase in women's health funding over the previous biennium.
- **Senate Bill 750** directs HHSC to evaluate and develop a limited postpartum care package for new mothers enrolled in the Healthy Texas Women (HTW) program and to develop

strategies to ensure continuity of care for newmothers who transition from Medicaid for Pregnant Women into HTW.

- **House Bill 475** ensures pregnant and parenting youth in foster care receive basic parenting education andservices to help preserve and strengthen their families.
- **House Bill 253** requires HHSC to develop and implement a fiveyear strategic plan to improve access toscreening, referral, treatment, and support services for postpartum depression.
- Senate Bill 748 creates a newborn screening preservation account to establish a dedicated, long-term fundingstream for newborn screenings conducted by the Department of State Health
 Services public health lab. Alsoestablishes several pilot programs related to maternal health: 1) a pregnancy medical home program to coordinatematernity care, 2) a program to improve care coordination services for women at higher risk for poor pregnancy, birth, or postpartum outcomes, and 3) a program to deliver prenatal and postpartum care through telehealth services.
- Senate Bill 436 improves screening to better identify and care for women with opi oid

use disorder, improves referrals to treatment and continuity of care, increases access to medication assisted treatment options, and enhances health care provided to pregnant women with opioid use disorder and to infants born addicted toopioids.

- **Senate Bill 2132** improves awareness of the Healthy Texas Women (HTW) progra m by adding information to thenotice sent to new mothers who are enrolled in HTW after having a baby.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates nearly \$8 million to the Department of State Health Services to include testing for X-ALD(adrenoleukodystrophy) in newborn screenings.

DRIVERS LICENSE PROGRAM

- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$223.7 million for the driver's license program to reduce wait times, improve customerservice, hire new employees, and add three additional driver's license offices statewide.
- **Senate Bill 616** establishes the conditional transfer of the driver's license program from DPS to the DMV and extends the expiration date of a driver's license from 6 to 8 years.

NATURAL RESOURCES

- **House Bill 1300** allows regulated cultivated oyster farming, providing a major economic boost to the seafoodand tourism industries along the Texas coast.
- House Bill 2846 protects the Brazos River basin's economic stability and growth by requiring the City of Houston totransfer ownership interests of the Allen's Creek Reservoir project to the Brazos River Authority. This will develop

critically needed water resources, reduce groundwater loss, and secure billions of dollar s in economic growth bydeveloping additional water supplies.

• **Senate Bill 26** permanently appropriates the sporting goods sales tax revenue to the Texas Parks & WildlifeDepartment and the Texas Historical Commission to these departments have a dedicated and sustainable revenue source to fund parks and historical sites.

CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

- House Bill 1 dedicates \$6.1 billion to TxDOT for non-tolled highway construction.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates \$86 million to TxDOT for building, construction and deferred maintenance. **\$250 million** of the funding is targeted to counties to address critically needed road infrastructure in energy producing areas
- **Senate Bill 14** increases access to high speed internet for rural Texans by allowing rural electric cooperatives theability to deploy broadband fiber in underserved areas of Texas.

· House

Bill 1 provides additional pipeline inspectors and more resources for abandoned well-plugging to the Texas Railroad Commission.

- **House Bill 1450** requires all electric utilities in Texas to annually inspect their power lines for safety hazards and filereports with the Public Util ity Commission in order to better prevent tragedies from occurring.
- Security Council, comprised of officials from the PUC, ERCOT and Office of the Governor to work with federal energy and national security officials to harden our grid against physical or cyber-attacks.

STRENGTHENING THE SANCTITY OF L IFE

- **House Bill 16,** the Infant Born Alive Protection Act, protects babies who survive abortions by requiring doctors toprovide the highest standard of medical care possible in an attempt to save the life of the baby.
- **Senate Bill 22** prevents local governments from contracting or conducting any tran saction of goods or services with abortion providers and their affiliates, ensuring taxpayer dollars are never used to subsidize the abortion industry.
- **House Bill 1** maintains the state's affiliate ban, which prohibits all abortion providers from receiving state funds, participating in the state's family planning and health care programs, and providing any sort of family planning or human sexuality instruction with public dollars.
- **House Bill 1** dedicates almost \$60 million to crisis pregnancy centers and Alternatives to Abortion, permits anadditional \$20 million in funding if demand warrants, and funds abstinence sexual education.

House Bill

2271 allows the Attorney General to use up to 2 percent of proceeds from Choose Life license plates for advertising, which would sell more license plates and yield more money for the Choose Life grant program.

- **Senate Bill 24**, the "Woman's Right to Know" act, requires a physician to hand deliver informational materials tomothers seeking an abortion when the initial consultation is conducted over the phone, ensuring they are provided accurate information and made aware of resources, risks and alternatives.
- **House Bill 1504** requires physicians to make a reasonable effort to transfer patients who are on life support and subject to the "10 day rule" to other physicians who are willing to provide life-extending treatment, should the families of the patient choose.

ADVANCING SECOND AMENDMENT RIGHTS

- **House Bill 121** protects law-abiding handgun license holders from being penalized for accidentally carrying theirhandgun into an establishment where firearms are prohibited.
- **House Bill 302** prohibits "no-firearms" clauses in residential leases, restores the rights of tenants to possesslawfully-owned

firearms and ammunition in the homes or spaces under their control, and protects their ability tofreely transport firearms between a vehicle, home or office without violating firearm trespass laws.

- **House Bill 1177** allows Texans without an LTC to lawfully carry a handgun while evacuating from and returning to adeclared disaster area, giving them the ability to protect their families during emergencies and put a stop to looterswho steal others' firearms when evacuations occur.
- **House Bill 2137** honors the sacrifice and expertise of retired peace officers with a proven handgun proficiency byexempting them from the classroom instruction component that is usually required to obtain a license to carry.
- House Bill

1791 closes loopholes in the state's "wrongful exclusion" law, which local governments a nd stateagencies frequently use as a way to restrict licensed gun owners from carrying in government buildings.

. House Bill 2363 makes it easier for Texas foster parents to readily access a weapon by allowing them to storefirearms and ammunition in the same locked location rather than in two different locked locations, as currentlaw requires.

- House Bill 3231 ensures a more consistent, uniform approach to enforcing firearms and ammunition ordinances statewide by incentivizing cities and counties to comply with state law instead of adopting patchwork regulations that are intended to restrict the 2nd Amendment rights of Texans.
- **Senate Bill 535** removes churches, synagogues and other places of worship from the list of locations wherecarrying a firearm is statutorily prohibited, restoring their right as private property owners to decide whetherlicensed carry is permitted on their premises.
- **Senate Bill 741** protects lawful gun owners who live in neighborhoods with homeowners' associations byprohibiting HOAs from

regulating or restricting the possession, transportation or storage of firearms in homes.

• **Senate Bill** 772 ensures that business owners who choose not to post signs forbidd ing handguns on their premises do not have greater liability than businesses that do, allowing them to base that decision solely on their preference, rather than the fear of lawsuits and added liability.

PROMOTING INDIVIDUAL LIBERTY

- **Senate Bill 1978** prevents governmental entities from denying contracts, loans, licenses or employmentopportunities to any person or business based on their religious affiliations.
- · House Bill 1631 bans the use of red-light cameras in Texas.
- **House Bill 234** ensures Texas children have the freedom to set up a neighborhood lemonade stand withoutbeing shut down because they don't have a permit.
- **Senate Bill 18** protects free speech on college campuses and prevents students from being silenced for exercisingtheir First Amendment rights.
- **HJR 38** gives Texas voters the opportunity to authorize a constitutional amendmen t removing the current option for a state income tax.
- House Bill 1545 allows consumers to buy a case of "beer to go" at local breweries.
